
No-one is indispensable. Everyone has their own take on following the model as closely as the manual prescribes. When one is in a leadership position for a protracted period of time you do tend to

And these are relevant and good thought processes and there's nothing wrong with them every now and then, but when there is never a counter balance of GOOD news. that's when the problems come in.

And that's about the only reason I love technology. Somehow Facebook, in its wisdom, figured out I read Nick Vujicic (probably cause I listed him in my favourite authors) and it has now linked me to his facebook page and it comes up on my wall every time he posts anything. And friends, I'd advise you to do the same. He is such a breath of fresh air who is doing such amazing things! Aside from inspiring miracle stories like one he had the other day where his passport ran out in some weird and wonderful little country and he had to get a new one in three days and prayer got him it, he is also the most cheerful chap imaginable. I am yet to see a negative word in his messages. The good he is doing ALL OVER the world is so inspiring! And he's refreshingly honest too, asking for prayer when he is battling. So I was really

enjoying hearing all his news and that, but then he went on a mission trip to South America and wow, things got real. In one night over 1,000 folk accepted Christ in a town in Columbia that I don't know how to pronounce. The next day he spoke to the entire police force and another 100 committed their lives and then the next day he shared a message of hope with over 20,000 people in one of the big cities. And the next post was about playing with the children in a big orphanage there. And that's just one guy! Sure he's a high profile and well known fella with an amazing testimony and a real gift and calling, there are thousands of other good folk out there also quietly doing their good works! So yes, there's HUGE persecution, but there is even more good!

In the movie "FACING THE GIANTS" there is a scene where the pastor is talking to the football coach, who was in serious need for some advice and guidance. He tells him a story about two farmers which needed to plant their crops, but needed rain to do so. So the two farmers went and prayed to God for rain. on what you have achieved as



In the traditional church calendar, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stand out in the month of November, set apart to remember the saints of the church and the souls of those who departed this world. It is fitting, then, that the modern church has set apart the month of November to remember and pray for the persecuted church, through the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP).



Believers in countries such as Egypt, Eritrea, India, Iran, Nigeria, Pakistan and Vietnam face violence, imprisonment and even death because of their faith in Jesus Christ. There are other places in the world such as North Korea where acts of persecution take place, but we don't see or hear of it. Brother Andrew of Open Doors once said: 'Our heroes are not with us simply because they are in prison.'

IDOP is a time set apart for us to remember thousands of our Christian brothers and sisters around the world who suffer persecution, simply because they confess Jesus Christ as Lord.



This year our focus includes the plight of Christians in India, who are suffering increasing persecution by militants who want a Hindu-only India
