But if you look up and around in the middle of it you are very likely to lose heart (and get tumbled and smashed and drowned in my case...!)

Lesson #2 DO IT ANYWAY! With my heroic disposition I've always like the famous Mark Twain quote "Courage is mastery of fear, not absence of fear." A repeat it many times as a mantra in between genuine and heartfelt prayers every time I think I see a shadow out there... My personal favourites are the turtles mainly because I have the satisfaction of finding something that is more scared than I am... They take one peek at us and bolt out of sight, most satisfying. But the bottom line is it is absolutely magical out there and I love it... and if I didn't overcome my uneasiness about actually getting wet and going out... I'd miss out on it all. Its really not worth letting fear hold you back from anything... there are admittedly many other rational reasons not to do certain things... but plain fear should never be one of them. You will regret it.

Having said all that you might wonder why on earth I go out if its so scary... because I'm over dramatizing it all! Yes it is a bit edgy and I do say the odd prayer, but I have my big stinky brother with me keeping me company
